About CAS

The Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society (CAS) is the national specialty society for anesthesiology in Canada. The CAS was founded in 1943 as a not-for-profit, voluntary organization and is guided by its vision of transformative patient care, with its mission to serve members and advance the specialty through leadership, advocacy, education, and research. CAS represents 2,500 members (anesthesiologists, family practice anesthetists, residents, anesthesia assistants, etc.) across Canada and around the world.

Joint Statement of the CEO and President

aving started both our roles in the Fall of 2022, 2023 saw us embark on what we often referred to as "a marathon at the pace of a sprint." Together, we identified a number of issues that needed improvement, and wasted no time in getting to work.

Our key focus for 2023 has been advocacy. We created a position statement outlining strategies to address the shortage of anesthesiologists and the surgical backlog, and promoted them by meeting with provincial healthcare decision-makers and media. Recognizing the clear need to scale and maintain the momentum behind our advocacy efforts, we created a Public Affairs Advisory Committee to support the Board on current and upcoming initiatives.

Given the ongoing impact that medication and equipment shortages have on our members, we continued to strengthen our relationship with Health Canada. We now receive regular communications and advise their decision-making bodies on the effects of these supply chain interruptions. We have also kept our members informed with the release of 5 medication safety/shortage bulletins in the past year.

Internally, we identified the need to enhance educational offerings for our membership. In 2023, we held twice as many continuing medical education (CME) webinars, thanks to the dedication of our section and committee chairs, as well as the CAS staff. We also launched our Pinnacle Rounds events, which feature exceptional grand rounds from various academic centres. This series has been very well received by CAS members since its inception in 2024.

Building on our 2022 Annual Meeting in Halifax—our first in-person meeting since COVID-19—the 2023 Annual Meeting held in Quebec City was a great success, with 800 attendees. Shortly afterwards, we created an Annual Meeting Scientific Planning Committee to oversee conference content moving forward. The transition to this new planning format has been smooth, and the committee has collaborated effectively with the CAS staff and our Annual Meeting event management team to create an outstanding program for our 2024 conference in Victoria.

Continuing our commitment to support vital research in our field, CAS, in partnership with CARF, awarded 8 research grants amounting to over \$200,000. This year, numerous prominent career researchers in anesthesia have expressed their deep appreciation for CAS' support, stating that their ongoing body of practice-changing work would not be possible without these grants.

Guided by a consulting firm and informed by extensive stakeholder input, our Board of Directors embarked on the task of creating a 5-year strategic plan for CAS. This plan will be essential to focusing our initiatives and resources on key priorities. We also recognized the need for a governance review—the first in 10 years—which will take place from 2024 to 2025.

Safeguarding our employees' health and creating opportunities for increased job satisfaction significantly contributes to staff retention and organizational stability. New leadership has also given us a chance to take a fresh look at our office team and better understand their workloads, skills, and career goals. This led to a reorganization of responsibilities and has enabled us to pinpoint needs and gaps that will inform future hiring decision. The budget has also undergone numerous fiscally responsible changes to ensure CAS' financial reserve and stability.

We look ahead to the upcoming year with great optimism. We are poised and eager to embark on a thorough assessment and positive transformation CAS' bylaws, policies, and procedures. This strengthening of our foundation is crucial and will enhance organizational health and impact in the future. A range of strategies to grow our membership will also be explored. We will keep up our advocacy momentum with ongoing meetings with government bodies and key stakeholders. In addition to keeping pace with human resource issues, we will also be addressing ways for our organization and specialty to embrace environmental sustainability best practices. Having identified the need for further expertise in public relations and marketing, we plan to hire a qualified individual to round out our wonderful national office team. Finally, we look forward to welcoming Dr Giuseppe Fuda this Fall in his new role as CAS President and have already started the onboarding process to ensure a smooth transition.

Advocacy and Communications Update

In 2023, the Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society (CAS) remained steadfast in its commitment to advocacy and communication initiatives, addressing pressing issues within the field. Here's a snapshot of our key activities:

CAS Medication Shortage Bulletins: Throughout the year, CAS released five critical bulletins addressing medication shortages, including those related to Endotracheal Tubes, Local Anesthetics, Succinylcholine Chloride, Semaglutide, and Ketamine Hydrochloride. These bulletins served as essential resources for healthcare professionals nationwide.

Strategies to Address the Surgical Backlog and Health Human Resource Issues in Anesthesia: This position statement aimed to inform discussions with provincial and federal policymakers, fostering an open dialogue about practical strategies and solutions for improving anesthesia care and delivery.

Media Mentions: CAS garnered significant media attention, particularly on anesthesiologist shortages and medication updates across the country. These mentions underscored the importance of addressing critical issues within the profession

Meetings with Provincial Leaders: CAS engaged in meaningful discussions with provincial leaders to address the challenges facing anesthesiologists and the profession at large. These discussions continued into 2024, demonstrating our ongoing commitment to advocacy and collaboration.

Public Affairs Advisory Committee: To prepare for the year ahead, CAS established a Public Affairs Advisory Committee. In November 2023, the committee convened to discuss progress and outline next steps. Key agenda items included promoting the ACT model for anesthesia delivery, advocating for increased anesthesia assistant positions and developing an environmental position statement.

As we reflect on the accomplishments of 2023, CAS remains dedicated to advocating for the needs of anesthesiologists and advancing excellence in anesthesia care across Canada.


What's Next for 2024

Supporting Our Residents

To support the profession and address the HHR shortage, CAS provides **complimentary membership** to anesthesia residents during the entirety of their 5-year residency. Newly certified anesthesiologists now receive significant discounts on CAS member fees in their first (60%), second (40%), and third (20%) years of practice. The discount program has increased the number of residents who converted to paid membership by 10% compared to previous years.

We continued our resident-focused programming at the 2023 CAS Annual Meeting, with the Residents Oral Competition and the Residents Panel Talk: "Life Beyond Residence: An Exploration of Career Paths and Lifestyle." We also awarded the Ontario's Anesthesiologists' - CAS Residents' Research Grant, valued at \$10,000.

Board of Directors Activities

CAS is committed to providing excellent service to our members. To ensure ongoing improvement, we began developing a new strategic plan, which takes a 360-degree view of the organization, with input from our board, members, partners, and staff. This plan will allow us to assess, prioritize, and develop a strong, clear and measurable map to lead CAS in the coming years. The strategic plan for 2025–2030 will be launched in the Fall of 2024.

In 2024 we have also begun a comprehensive governance review. This will include a review of our Society's existing bylaws and policies, which were last updated in 2014. This project aims to improve our organization's functionality, inclusiveness, and transparency.



A RECORD Year of Learning

Serving our membership by providing education, which is often member-exclusive or free for members, is central to the Society's mission. Whenever possible, education is accredited to help ensure members maintain their credentials. The dedicated CAS members who support our sections and committees helped enable a RECORD high educational calendar in 2023. CAS produced 18 educational offerings—compared to the 10 provided in 2022.

2023 Education Highlights

CAS Medication Safety Webinar - February 16, 2023



In response to growing concerns over drug shortages, multiple short-term replacement solutions, and their contribution to/potential for harmful medication errors, the CAS Quality and Patient Safety Committee organized a medication safety webinar.

CAS Chronic Pain Webinar - September 27, 2023

This webinar promoted the advancement of neuromodulation in the treatment of chronic pain and provided leadership in the responsible and safe use of neuromodulation therapies.

CAS Earth Day Webinar - April 22, 2023



The CAS Environmental Sustainability Section hosted a webinar on Earth Day, which raised awareness of ocean sustainability and what it means for healthcare.

Perioperative Webinar - October 24, 2023

This webinar highlighted the importance of resuscitative transesophageal echocardiography (TEE) as an innovative form of point of care ultrasound (POCUS) that important in the perioperative period.

CAS: Looking Back on 80 Years - October 12, 2023



On World Anesthesia Day, the CAS Archives and Artifacts Committee held a webinar detailing the evolution of CAS, as well as our major milestones and achievements. This webinar was an extension of CAS' 80th anniversary celebrations.

CJA Webinar - November 15, 2023



In November, the Canadian Journal of Anesthesia (CJA) discussed a special issue entitled, "A Brain-Based Definition of Death and Criteria for Its Determination After Arrest of Circulation or Neurologic Function in Canada: A 2023 Clinical Practice Guideline."

Continuation of Popular Neuroanesthesia National Virtual Rounds

Thanks to the leadership of our <u>Neuroanesthesia Section</u>, the Society provided quarterly accredited rounds on a variety of neuroscience topics, including "Perioperative Blood Management for Stroke Thrombectomy," "Mannitol vs Hypertonic Saline," and more.

New Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Module

CAS values and embraces inclusion and considers it fundamental to organizational health and success. In June 2023, the <u>CJA</u> produced a special issue: "Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion in Anesthesiology and Critical Care." To complement this issue, we launched the <u>CPD Module</u> "Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion in Anesthesiology: A Primer" to enable members to obtain Section 3 credits.

Problem-Based Learning Discussions (PBLDs)

To expand access to Section 3 CME credits, CAS held our first virtual PBLDs outside of the CAS Annual Meeting, and plans to host more in 2024. The 2023 sessions were:

2023 CAS Annual Meeting

Friday June 9

The conference kicked off with a Welcome Reception at the Quebec City Convention Centre, where attendees enjoyed delicious food and mingled with fellow delegates and exhibitors. Later, the Canadian Anesthesia Research Foundation (CARF) hosted a lively Kick-Off Party at the iconic Brasserie Inox in Old Quebec, offering a vibrant setting for networking and socializing.

Saturday June 10

The first day of conference featured an Opening Ceremony that honored the 2023 CAS Honour and Research Program award recipients, followed by a keynote address from Dr Alika Lafontaine, the first Indigenous President of the Canadian Medical Association. Other highlights included the annual Residents and Richard Knill Competitions, along with engaging sessions covering a wide range of topics such as chronic pain, perioperative care, regional anesthesia, patient safety, obstetric anesthesia, environmental sustainability, pediatrics, neuroanesthesia, and cardiovascular and thoracic issues. The day also included the CARF plenary session "Using Research to Guide the Journey to Better Outcomes for Our Most Vulnerable Patients," while the 11th Annual Anesthesia History Symposium explored "Archives and Artifacts." The day concluded with the President's Party, a relaxed evening at the Musée de la Civilisation, offering attendees a chance to unwind and connect with colleagues.

Annual Meeting Highlights - Quebec City, June 9-12, 2023

Sunday June 11

The second day of the conference featured diverse sessions and PBLDs led by prominent speakers and moderators. The CAS Annual Business Meeting included reports from CAS, CARF, CASIEF, CJA, and WFSA, and the election of divisional representatives. CAS President Dr Filteau addressed "The Future of Anesthesia Delivery in Canada" during the President's Session. Attendees engaged in the CJA Symposium on recent RCTs challenging dogma and the John Wade Patient Safety Symposium focused on quality improvement in B.C. The CASIEF Fundraising Pub Night at Chez Murphy's pub concluded the day with camaraderie and support for educational initiatives.

Monday June 12

The Annual Meeting concluded with a short Monday program, culminating in an Awards Ceremony & Session. The ceremony recognized onsite winners, including the Richard Knill and Residents Competion winners. Afterwards, the session focused on strategies for managing the medication safety landscape.

2023 Key Highlights

- In 2023, we offered the Career Scientist Award and several operating grants in 3 categories: residents, new investigators, and open awards.
- It was the first year we awarded 3 section grants supported by our CVT, Education and Simulation in Anesthesia, and Obstetric Anesthesia Sections.

Committee Highlights

ur committees exist to educate, provide guidance and serve the membership. Below is a selection of of activities our committees accomplished in 2023.



Quality and Patient Safety Committee

In February 2023, the <u>committee</u> organized the year's most attended webinar, which addressed the drug shortages and medication errors facing anesthesia departments across Canada. The webinar facilitated a high-level discussion led by senior representation from national organizations such as Health Canada, the Institute for Safe Medication Practices Canada, HealthPRO Procurement Services, and CAS. It also introduced future strategic directions pertaining to medication safety within CAS. The committee continued to publish safety information in the CAS newsletter, and in *Anesthesia News* with "Equity: The Forgotten QI Element" (March 2023) and "PIV Injuries in OR" (December 2023). It also launched a national call for highlighting and disseminating local quality improvement initiatives and collaborated with CAS to release 2 medication safety bulletins regarding the Sandoz Ketamine Hydrochloride and Succinylcholine Chloride shortages in Canada.

NEW: Annual Meeting Scientific Program Committee

In the summer of 2023, the <u>Annual Meeting Scientific Program Committee (AMSPC)</u> was established as the scientific planning committee for the CAS Annual Meeting. This team was tasked with planning and executing scientific programs that offer our members top-quality content, and overseeing abstract competitions and presentations for future conferences. They successfully implemented a new "Call for Content" application, which ensures conference topics address "needs-assessment" concerns of the membership, and a review matrix to evaluate proposals.

NEW: Public Affairs Committee

In the Fall of 2023, the <u>Public Affairs Committee</u> was created to advise the CAS Board of Directors. This committee plays a crucial role in advocating for policies and initiatives that enhance patient safety and access to anesthesia care in Canada. The committee is comprised of members from different geographical locations, to encompass different perspectives when developing position statements and key asks. It aims to build collaborative relationships with government at the federal, provincial, and territorial levels, and support the development of communications to help inform the public of the important work our members do to ensure patient safety.



Committee Highlights

Clinical Practice Guidelines Committee

CAS supports the greater anesthesia community by promoting patient health and safety through the annually updated Guidelines to the Practice of Anesthesia. Through the leadership and hard work of the Clinical Practice Guidelines Committee, chaired by Dr Gregory Dobson, the 2024 revised edition of the Guidelines was submitted for publication in the CJA.

Continuing Education and Professional Development Committee

As an accredited CPD provider of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, CAS reviews and accredits Section 1 and Section 3 (both self-assessment program (SAP) and simulation (SIM) activities) and can engage in co-development projects with non-physician organizations. In 2023, we successfully processed 23 accreditation applications, comprising 58 education activities ranging in complexity from 1-hour webinars to multi-day conferences, with multiple Section 1 streams and Section 3 activities. We approved over 270 hours of CME credits for CAS and other organizations, addressing all the CanMEDS roles (146 hours of Section 1, 106 hours of Section 3 SAP, and 21 hours of Section 3 SIM). We had 9 external reviewers, one of which was dedicated to CAS webinars and activities.

Archives and Artifacts Committee

In 2023, the Archives and Artifacts Committee played an integral role in proudly celebrating CAS' 80th anniversary as a pioneering anesthesia membership society. The committee hosted a history symposium during the Annual Meeting in Quebec City and the inaugural World Anesthesia Day webinar: "Looking Back on 80 Years." It also completed the Presidential Interviews project to memorialize the legacies of past presidents who have steered the CAS through its evolution and advocated tirelessly for anesthesia advancement, both nationally and internationally. By documenting their lives and contributions, the project honors their pivotal roles in shaping CAS and amplifying the voices of anesthesia professionals across Canada and globally.

Section Highlights

ur sections are self-forming segments of the membership who focus on a particular sub-specialty, practice profile or professional interest. Below is a selection of activities our sections accomplished in 2023.



Neuroanesthesia Section National Virtual Rounds

The <u>CAS Neuroanesthesia Section</u> National Virtual Round Series was established in October 2021, with the goal of bringing the latest knowledge in the field to section members and the wider CAS membership and to provide a forum for discussion. The section launched 4 rounds in February, April, September, and November respectively. The widely attended series continues in 2024.

Perioperative Section

The CAS Perioperative Section believes that anesthesiologists are uniquely positioned to touch each phase of perioperative medicine and regularly join with other sections in promoting new and safe anesthesia practices. In 2023, they hosted a webinar: "The Role of Resuscitative Transesophageal Echocardiography (TEE)" in response to CAS members frequently identifying point-of-care ultrasound (POCUS) and TEE as key topics of interest.

Chronic Pain Section

The Chronic Pain Section focuses on increasing awareness of the challenges individuals living with chronic pain face, advocating for safe pain practices. In 2023, they hosted a webinar, "Outcomes of Neuromodulation in Chronic Pain Conditions." The webinar promoted the advancement of neuromodulation in the treatment of chronic pain and provides leadership in the responsible and safe use of neuromodulation therapies.

Environmental Sustainability Section

The CAS Environmental Sustainability Section hosted a webinar on Earth Day that successfully raised awareness on ocean sustainability and what it means for healthcare. The section also conducted an evidence-based review and Delphi consensus project to gather recommendations for environmental sustainability practice in regional anesthesia. They continue to work alongside the CAS Board to monitor and respond to changing trends and advocacy.

Monthly issues include invited editorials, reports of original investigation (clinical and basic sciences articles), systematic reviews, narrative reviews, accredited CPD modules, reflections, case reports/case series, letters to the editor, and special articles. The CJA proudly publishes the annually revised CAS Guidelines to the Practice of Anesthesia. Led by Editor-in-Chief Dr Stephan Schwarz, the editorial team includes 12 editors and 22 Editorial Board members. 2023 was a particularly active year, with the completion of numerous editorial priority projects, including special/focus issues on Green Anesthesia (March), Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion in Anesthesiology and Critical Care (June), and Gastric Ultrasound (August).

In April, we launched a very special issue—the most ambitious project in the CJA's long publishing history—in partnership with the Canadian Critical Care Society, Canadian Blood Services, the Canadian Medical Association, and Health Canada. The issue provided a new Canadian Clinical Practice Guideline on a brain-based definition of death and criteria for its determination after arrest of circulation or neurologic function. Widely endorsed by Canadian medical and scholarly societies and bodies, this guideline appeared alongside over 25 accompanying articles. Click here to read more.

Canadian Anesthesia Research Foundation La Fondation canadienne de recherche en anesthésie

The Canadian Anesthesia Research Foundation (CARF) was founded in 1979 to administer funds and provide support to Canadian researchers in anesthesia, who are members of the CAS. These funds are essential to ensuring the stability and success of anesthesia researchers in Canada.

In 2023, CARF undertook several initiatives to enhance its support for anesthesia research. Notably, we sent out information packages to past award recipients, urging them to acknowledge CARF's support in their presentations. Plans were made to expand CAS member representation on the CARF Board of Trustees and foster pride in colleagues' research achievements. Collaboration between CARF and CASIEF was strengthened through merged activities to reflect our shared vision for advancing anesthesia research. CARF held its annual fundraiser, "The CARF Kick-off Party" at the Brasserie Inox in iconic Old Quebec. The party was a success, with guests enjoying classic French fare and locally produced beer.

The <u>2023 CAS-CARF Research Program</u> offered 8 awards totaling \$210,000. This amount was possible through CARF's fundraising efforts and our partnership with CAS Sections and Ontario's Anesthesiologists (OA). A total of \$30,000 in grants were contributed by 3 sections, and the OA provided \$10,000 towards the Residents' Research Grant.

The Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society International Education Foundation (CASIEF) was founded in 1996 with a mission to support partners in low- and middle-income countries in expanding their anesthesiology workforce to improve perioperative care, critical care, and pain management. Shortages of trained personnel and equipment create massive barriers to care in many parts of the world, and CASIEF works to remedy this. In 2023, CASIEF continued full in-person activities at its partner programs in Rwanda, Guyana, and 2 in Ethiopia. Canadian volunteers travelled to teach at these sites and longer-term global health fellows provided continuity in education. In addition, we provided in-person simulation training courses, as well as regular virtual case management rounds. A formal regional anesthesia fellowship program has been established in Guyana, and a knowledge translation fellowship program assists faculty in Rwanda.

CASIEF hosted a well attended symposium on the global impact of healthcare systems on the environment, and an event fundraising pub night at the 2023 CAS Annual Meeting in Quebec City. As our partner programs in Ethiopia and Rwanda have been expanding rapidly, our goals for 2024 are to increase regular volunteer and global health fellow educational trips, provide simulation and safe obstetrics and pediatrics courses, and ramp up regional anesthesia training.

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
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
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
